BEFORE THE OPEN HOUSE



In preparing for an open house, you need more than balloons and cookies; you need a safety plan in place before, during and after the visitors show up. Use the following checklist to minimize your risks.

	Prepare the Sellers – Tell them to secure valuables, prescription drugs included.
	Assess the Marketing – Showing valuables and vacant properties entices criminals.
	Never Work Alone – Get a friend, family member or business associate to join you.
	Meet the Neighbors – Neighbors provide extra eyes and ears (and potential new business).
	Use a Cloud-based Camera – On-site surveillance is a crime deterrent.
	Survey the Physical Layout of the Property – Backyards and tight spaces are safety concerns
	Visit Police and Fire Stations – Invite law enforcement to stop by for refreshments.

	Avoid Certain Rooms – Avoid getting trapped in tight quarters or isolated areas like attics.
	Add Doorbell Alerts – Put an alert on door handles to tell you when someone new enters.
	Evaluate Every Prospect – Take notes on guests' appearances, names and vehicles.
	Check In Regularly – Stay in contact with a buddy if you happen to be alone.

	Close with a Buddy – Have someone with you when you close up.
	Secure the Home – Double-check that every window is or has remained locked.
	Express Gratitude – Thank any neighbors or law enforcement that stopped by.
